Catholic Children's Society Plymouth

Just before half term, all schools were sent a small ink cartridge recycling box to help raise funds for the Catholic Children's Society (Plymouth) simply by recycling your old ink cartridges via the Recycle4Charity programme. At a recent CCSP Board meeting, it was agreed that a box should be sent to each Catholic school in our Diocese giving you the opportunity to help with our fundraising. Unfortunately, it is not possible to recycle the larger cartridges used in most school's printers and only those small cartridges generally used in home printers that can fit easily into the palm of your hand, can be popped in the box. This recycling scheme has raised £1,069.21 since CCSP started the scheme in July 2008. However, in the last twelve months alone, £206 has been raised! This recycling scheme is becoming more popular, and one parish recently collected a box full of ink cartridges in four weeks and raised over £50! The box can be found in reception.

This week, we been thinking about how we can be honest, which is part of showing integrity. We have explored how it is not always easy to be honest but about how it can help us to grow and move forward.
