
Class: Foundation Stage Acorns

Most of the activities this week are going to be based around a story - The story is Jack and the Beanstalk.



You may have a version of this story at home. You may have heard this story before as it is a well-known traditional story.

Don't worry if you haven't as you will be able to listen to Mrs Keeping and Mrs Clarke reading the story on Tapestry.

Have fun with some of the activities below but please remember we do not expect you to complete them all! Have fun and follow your child's lead. If they want to make Jacks house rather that the castle then do that. If they want to bake a nice healthy bean tea then go with it - The activities around this story are endless!

Foundation Stage suggested activities for Week 11.05.2020

Listen to the story of Jack and the Beanstalk. This could be one you have at home or one online or the one read by Mrs Keeping / Mrs Clarke.

Discuss with you child the following questions -

What was your favourite part of the story? Why?

How many beans did Jack get when he sold the cow?

How do you think Jack's Mum felt when she saw that Jack had sold the cow for beans / when she saw the beanstalk in the garden?

Why did Jack get sent to bed?

How do think Jack felt when he climbed up the beanstalk? Why?

Why did Jack's Mum chop down the beanstalk?

Using Puppets - Have a go at retelling the story.

Attached are some puppets or you can draw your own. You could use sticks from your garden or daily walk to put them on.





Try using a big, deep voice when you are the giant!

Staying active -

- •Tell the children they are going to be beans. Explain that they need to listen to which type of bean they will be and then move like that type of bean.
- •Start off with about 3 different types of beans. This can be increased as the children get used to playing the game.

Jelly bean




Baked bean

Curl up very small on the ground.


Walk up on tiptoes and say 'ooh la la.'

Shake like jelly.




Have a go at learning some Jack in the Beanstalk songs!



Keep up the reading -


The focus at this age is on sharing stories, songs, and rhymes together and building talking and listening skills.
